Note: In this letter to the Corinthian church, Paul was addressing confusion and dysfunction regarding sexual matters to both single and married believers.

2. Read **V1-4**. Comment on the counsel given to wives regarding their bodies?
3. a) From **V5-6**, what exception did he give and why?

b) Also, what caution did he give?
4. What do you think are the two "gifts" Paul is referring to in **V6-7**?
5. Paul affirmed the single life as a "gift." What are some practical ways we can affirm singles in this way?

SECTION II: Read 1 Corinthians 7:8-9, 25-38

6. Read **V8** together with **Genesis 2:18**. As you track the word "good," how do you reconcile these seemingly contradictory verses?
7. From **V26-27**, what else does Paul declare as "good"?
8. a) What is the hard truth about marriage expressed in **V28b**?

b) Why is this truth important to acknowledge if married or single

9. To what is Paul referring in **V29** when he states that the time is short? (See **Matthew 24:44**.)

10. a) According to **V29-31**, how is each group supposed to live in light of the shortness of time?

b) How do you balance the pulls of this world with the affairs of the Lord?

14. Read **V36-38** (see also **V9**). What was Paul's conclusion about getting married versus remaining single?

SECTION III: Read Titus 2:1-5

15. According to **V3**, Titus was to teach the older women to:

- a) ...“be reverent.” What does “reverent” mean, and what are ways we can live as reverent women?
- b) ...“not to be slanderers.” How do we women slander, and what are the ripple effects?
- c) ...“not addicted to much wine.” How can believers keep this in check? How do you?

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16. a) What are the six additional things older women are to teach the younger women in **V4-5**?
- b) With which of these do you most struggle, and how could you benefit from training in this area?
17. How do you think the Word of God could be maligned or dishonored by the way the women of a church conduct themselves?
18. For those of you who are older women, how have you sought to influence the younger women God has placed in your life? For those of you who are the younger women, describe your relationship with the older women in the church.
19. a) The world offers enough “bad and ugly” examples of how to live as a single or married woman. What “good” counsel from Paul will you remember most and apply to your life?
- b) Write a prayer asking for God’s help in that area.
