

LESSON 3: JOB 1:6-12

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| I. | God says...THAT'S MY BOY! | Job 1:6-8 |
| II. | Satan says...I HAVE A PLOY! | Job 1:9-12 |

Truth #1: It would blow my mind if I truly grasped how God "considers" me.

Truth #2: Satan's ploy is to prove I don't love God for God alone.

ACT 1 Ch 1-2

PROSE PROLOGUE: Narrator sets the stage for the upcoming true Drama of Job's life

<u>Scene 1</u>	1:1-5	<i>On Earth:</i> Snapshot of Job's life...his finances, fame & family
<u>Scene 2</u>	1:6-12	<i>In Heaven:</i> God & Satan's 1 st conversation
<u>Scene 3</u>	1:13-19	<i>On Earth:</i> 1 st wave of Job's tragedies
<u>Scene 4</u>	1:20-22	<i>On Earth:</i> Job's response to 1 st wave of tragedies
<u>Scene 5</u>	2:1-6	<i>In Heaven:</i> God & Satan's 2 nd conversation
<u>Scene 6</u>	2:7-10	<i>On Earth:</i> Job & his wife's response to the 2 nd wave of tragedy
<u>Scene 7</u>	2:11-13	<i>On Earth:</i> Job's 1 st week with his friends

ACT 2 Ch 3-42:6

POETIC DRAMA: Job's conversations with his friends (Eliphaz, Bildad, Zophar, Elihu) and God

<u>Scene 1</u>	Ch 3	Job laments
<u>Scene 2</u>	Ch 4-14	Job's 1 st round of conversations with his 3 friends
<u>Scene 3</u>	Ch 15-21	Job's 2 nd round of conversations with his 3 friends
<u>Scene 4</u>	Ch 22-27	Job's 3 rd round of conversations with his 3 friends
<u>Scene 5</u>	Ch 28	Poetic Interlude on Wisdom
<u>Scene 6</u>	Ch 29-31	Job's final defense
<u>Scene 7</u>	Ch 32-37	Elihu's speech
<u>Scene 8</u>	38-42:6	God and Job's conversations

ACT 3 Ch 42:7-17

PROSE EPILOGUE: Narrator states how things ended before the curtain closes
